SMITHSONIAN AIR & SPACE MUSEUM VISIT



ach year in 5th grade science, students eagerly anticipate the final curriculum unit of the year — outer space! In order to help students contextualize what they learn, the unit study concluded in a visit to the **Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum.** Students shared that their favorite parts of the field trip were the scavenger hunt and the different exhibits, specifically "Women in Aviation" and "Rockets and Missiles".

A highlight for this year's museum visit was that the current 6th grade students were able to attend as well, as they were unable to visit last year due to pandemic museum closures. One sixth grade student spent the majority of the field trip flying a controller plane, seeing the laws of gravity and physics at work. Having the 6th graders as a part of this year's visit was a long-awaited culmination of their study from last year and it was special to see them enjoy it alongside their peers!









EXPANDING ATHLETICS

Cornerstone's spring sports are in full swing! This year we have introduced two new sports to our Cornerstone Lions student athletes: soccer and tennis. It has been exciting to see students eager to participate and learn new skills.

The Lions soccer program has 28 students between 3rd-7th grades participating in our weekly workouts. The goal for this spring's soccer program is to help our students learn fundamental skills as we build momentum for launching Cornerstone's first ever elementary soccer team next fall. Thank you to two of our wonderful partner organizations, Washington Spirit and Leveling the Playing Field, for the excellent

coaching of our young athletes and for surprising our athletes with new cleats!

The introduction of tennis for our students has brought a lot of excitement. Twice a week, our high school students load into the school vans for their tennis elective at the **Washington**

Tennis and Education Foundation (WTEF) located less than a mile from Cornerstone. We also have a number of our elementary students enrolled in WTEF's daily after school program. Tennis has gained a lot of momentum with our athletes, and **we look forward to offering competitive high school tennis teams**

to offering competitive high school tennis teams next spring! Our partnership with WTEF has been a tremendous blessing in giving our students exposure and opportunity to engage in a new sport.





ur K-4th grade students have begun taking turns leading weekly lower school Chapel, which will continue until the end of the school year. By giving each class the opportunity to lead a Chapel for their fellow students—through performing skits, reading scripture, leading prayer, and presenting songs—students learn to engage deeper within the lessons that Jesus wants to teach us through his Word. Through preparing for these Chapel services, students increase their understanding by

learning how to share and "teach" their peers.

Leading up to Easter, our K-6th grade classes collaborated on decorating the school hallways to create a resurrection walk. Students creatively depicted the events that took place during Holy Week, from the passover feast to the empty tomb, and each class had the opportunity to walk through the experience together. It is beautiful to see the ways that our lower school students are growing as spiritual leaders in our school!








BUDDING AUTHORS

his spring, our **second grade scholars** have been learning about how weather impacts plants, animals, and humans. In conjunction with this unit, they have also been studying the writing process and have practiced writing informative paragraphs focusing on a topic statement, supporting details, and a conclusion. Second grade teacher, Ms. Twaddell, told students that if they put in their very best effort the class would get to turn their writings into real, printed books. So, after two weeks of hard work, Ms. Twaddell printed and bound copies of each student's book for them to take home and share with their families as well as to add to their classroom's very own library. This project gave our second grade students the "writing bug", so now they are all writing their own narrative fiction books!
